

Message by Bishop Kosen Ishikawa

Dear Members and Friends,


There are times when we need to face reality that is painful. During those times, especially amid ongoing pandemic, we must support each other as we deal with many feelings that we might experience. It is with my great sorrow to inform you that our minister of Betsuin, **Rev. Kanjun Nakano** passed away at Kuakini Hospital on July 10, 2020. He was 68 years old.



He has suffered cancers and hoped he could go back to Japan to fight with cancers with his family. However, his body had become so weak so quickly because of his malnutrition. When he was taken to ER on June 28, he was so skinny. No one knew his stage of cancer but at that time we were able to guess easily he was not doing well.

Soon after meeting Rev. Nakano at the hospital on July 3rd, I was notified he wouldn't survive till August. He told me he wished to see his children and asked me to come again. He also said "Yoroshiku and Mahalo" to everyone. Rev. Nakano's son and his wife decided to come to Hawaii immediately.

However, it was not easy for the family to come to Hawaii since there were no direct flights to Hawaii from Japan. Also, there were ongoing 14 days quarantine order and the hospital had its own regulations to restrict visitors. I'm very grateful to compassionate staffs of Kuakini Hospital and our supportive board members who continued to offer help and prayers to Rev. Nakano and his family. Thanks to their efforts to make Rev. Nakano's last wish to come true, with special permits, we were allowed to visit Rev. Nakano directly from the airport after their arrival by way of Guam on July 9.

Unfortunately, when we arrived at ICU around 9:20 pm, he was receiving oxygen administration and he couldn't talk anymore. Doctor told us he could die anytime tonight. But at least he made it hanging on since he was able to see his son and daughter-in-law before he died. When we entered the room, his eyes were closed. But soon after we spoke to him, he opened his eyes wide open which continued until he took his last breath.

In Japanese, there is a saying that "Eyes are more eloquent than mouth." While looking at his eyes, his eyes were telling something. All of a sudden, I had an idea. I asked Rev. Nakano to show us his blink if he could hear us. Surprisingly, he did show us blink three times which made us know he was listening. The family was able to deliver their messages to their heart's content. His daughter in Japan also talked to him on the facetime. This also encouraged me to chant Nenbutsu and sutras for several hours and I also showed some of my videos that Rev. Nakano played Buddhist Gatha.

I saw numbers of pulse, blood pressure on the machine were slowly decreasing as sunrise gets closer. I didn't know what numbers meant but at least we knew the time was coming. Tears kept falling and I couldn't stop crying as I heard words of appreciation from his son and daughter-in-law. Love of the family, kindness of the people touched my heart. Above all, I was touched by the greatest compassion of Amida Buddha who made vows to save us all and would come to welcome Rev. Nakano. At 5:05 am, Rev. Nakano drew his last breath and died quietly.

Although I have experienced many Makuragyo and funerals, this was my first time to see the last moment of a dying person in front of me. In the past, I had some regrets that I missed the last moments. One time I offered Nenbutsu for nearly two hours for our dying member and felt enough and came back to the temple. But soon after coming back to the temple, I received a phone call from the family that he passed away soon after I left the house. This kind of experience and regrets happened several times in the past. These surely gave me some energy to stay up all night long for Rev. Nakano. This time I did everything I could do and I had no regrets except feeling of sorry and missing him.

Honestly I don't know if I could provide this kind of service to all our members in the future but at least I renewed my vow to offer my dana as much as possible because I realized last moment was so important.

The family decided to have a funeral service in Japan but I am going to offer a memorial prayer for Rev. Nakano as a part of Sunday Service at Jodo Mission of Hawaii at 10:00 am on Sunday, August 2nd with Rev. Nakano's son, Atsushi and his wife Kumiko's attendance. For our safety, we need to limit numbers of attendance as low as possible and your making reservation of seats will be greatly appreciated. Betsuin Mourns the Passing of Rev. Kanjun Nakano

He was a very private person and will be remembered as the minister who did meditation with music. Each Sunday Service he would play something on the piano be it a Beatles' song, Elvis Presley or Chopin and sometimes a Japanese classical song while each person relaxes and breaths from within. He was a music professor before becoming a minister. It was very touching when he would play a song to the deceased person at the end of a few funerals or 49th day service as his gift to the deceased. Some remembers him for his beautiful voice when chanting.

New members to our Sunday Service may remember him for always letting us know when the congregation can join in the chanting with his saying "together" and would explain in English the prayers for Amida Buddha and all other Buddhas, St. Zendo, St. Honen, former ministers of Betsuin and their wives, etc.


Betsuin Mourns the Passing of Former President David Kanji Miyamoto

President from 1994 to Feb. 2001; Assistant Treasurer from 2001 to 2012

David Kanji Miyamoto was President of Jodo Mission of Hawaii from 1994 to February 2001 and was Assistant Treasurer from 2001 to 2012. David's father, **Buntetsu Miyamoto** was Bishop of this temple and Jodo Shu in Hawaii from 1949 to August 1961. David's brother Clifford is currently on the Jodo Mission Board of Directors and was President of Jodo Mission of Hawaii from 2001 to 2006. The Miyamoto family has given a lot of their time and energy to Jodo Mission and we are truly grateful!

David passed away on June 1, 2020 at the age of 96. His funeral was held on July 25 at Jodo Mission of Hawaii with Bishop Kosen Ishikawa. He is survived by wife Ethel, three daughters Karen, Anne and Susan Utsugi, two grandchildren and siblings Clifford Miyamoto and Keiko Yamagata. David was employed by City Bank of Honolulu where he worked his way up to Vice President and branch manager. He was a founding member of the Pearl City Lions Club where he served the community for over 64 years. His Lions Club also helped Jodo Mission on many of its activities like bon dance.

This Zoom link will be for the above services only. During each service, Ian Kitajima will be making a video and the video link will be posted on the website jodo.us and Facebook website. The video link will be available for one year.

YouTube Live Stream: Bishop Ishikawa is also planning to do a live stream of these two O-Bon Services which you may view at his YouTube Channel.

What Happens at these Virtual Services: These virtual services will be held in the temple. Ministers will do sutra chanting and when all the chanting is finished, the ministers will begin reading all the Otoba sponsor's names and the deceased names beginning with the Hatsubon families, then regular Otobas and then Chutoba names (over 500+ Otobas). After all the names have been called, the ministers will go down to the Social Hall and go through each row of Otobas for the final blessing of that service.

What is “virtual” - We apologize if you are unaware what “virtual” services are. The term “virtual” has been used for meetings, for services, Sunday Services but some people may wonder what does it mean. The definition used in the dictionary is *an artificial environment which is experienced through sensory stimuli (such as sights and sounds) provided by a computer and in which one’s actions partially determine what happens in the environment*, however, during this COVID-19 period it has become a way in which people are able to communicate with each other using technology and yet staying apart and keeping safe.

For meetings, you still have the meeting but it is not face to face. You may see each other on a computer screen or a laptop or smartphone and if there is a microphone you can carry on a discussion. In the case of a Sunday Service, there is a Sunday Service but the minister may be at the temple on another island or another state and you are watching it at your own computer or laptop or smartphone. It is just not in person but you are able to join the service and recite and join in the sutra chanting and sing the gathas. Unfortunately, many people who do not have a computer or a laptop or a smartphone may not be able to “link in” (which means you see a line on the computer with the site of the service and you can just tap on it and join the Sunday Service). In some cases when the service is on YouTube it may turn into a video and you are able to view the service later.

For those of you who do not have any computer or a laptop or a smartphone, you may want to put your hands together in gassho and light a senko at your Butsudan during this virtual service. At your

Butsudan, you could have a cucumber (horse) and eggplant (cow) which tells your ancestors to quickly come back to this world via the cucumber horse and slowly return to the Pure Land via the eggplant cow and see you again next year and hope next year we will be able welcome you at the Otaba.



Segaki-dan: *Segaki-dan* is a special altar decorated with banners listing the Buddhas of the Five Directions (East, South, West, North, and Center) which are set up at O-Bon to welcome the beloved ones and ancestral spirits. Water, rice and meals are offered on the table of the altar. This Segaki-dan from 2019 will again be in the temple and another one will be in the social hall. Both stands have been either weather beaten or termite eaten so someone is rebuilding both stands for 2020 O-Bon.
