Covid-19 snapshot

It can be difficult to keep in perspective the impact of Covid-19 in various places around the world. Consider the table below that shows a snapshot of the death toll expressed in deaths per million of populations in a number of countries (as at May 23):

Whilst avoiding political comment, there are a number of interesting observations:

- Australia and New Zealand have done a spectacularly good job notwithstanding the benefits of being island nations
- the impact in Western Europe and the UK is horrendous
- the US has close to the total of the next 3 highest combined deaths (Spain, UK, Italy)
- I would probably take the numbers relating to China and India with some scepticism for a number of reasons
- it is also fair to say that given the variation in testing regimes and in fact the ability to reach population for testing that the numbers for most countries, both in the developing and developed nations are potentially significantly understated and will never truly be understood.

Whatever the weaknesses of data capture, it does reinforce however, the strength of our own response and the importance of recognising the important mitigation issues as we continue towards freeing up the restrictions put in place by government to protect us. It is not as we hear in some countries, a government's attempt to take away our rights, but rather a sensible and measured response to ensure the safety of us all.



On this day in... May 27:

Event: 1679 - Habeaus Corpus Act (strengthening person's right to challenge unlawful arrest & imprisonment) passes in England. **1940** - British and Allied forces begin the evacuation of Dunkirk (Operation Dynamo) during WWII. **1967** - Australians vote in favour of a constitutional referendum granting the Australian government the power to make laws to benefit Indigenous Australians and count them in the national census. **2018** - Indianapolis 500: Will Power becomes the first Australian driver to win the event. **2019** - World's rivers widely contaminated with antibiotics according to new global study of 711 sites.

Births: 1901 - Conrad Elvehjem, American biochemist and nutrition scientist (discovered niacin).

1922 - Sir Christopher Lee, English actor (Lee began his film career working for Hammer Films, which he did for two decades, his most famous role as Dracula. Lee later branched out appearing in the critically acclaimed "Wicker Man" (1970) and as the Bond villain Scaramanga in "The Man with the Golden Gun" (1974)).

1923 - Henry Kissinger, US Secretary of State (1973-77) and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1973.

1965 - Pat Cash, Australian tennis player (Wimbledon 1987).
