With our annual golf day now behind us, it's time to focus on the next major fundraising event - raising funds to support the work done by Very Special Kids.

On Sunday September 10th at Core24 Frankston, the club will hold its third "8 hour treadmill and exercise bike challenge". This year's goal is to raise \$40,000 to support Very Special Kids as they provide free holistic children's palliative care services including clinical care, counselling, sibling support, bereavement support and community activities for seriously ill children in the Frankston community and Victoria.

In the past three years, Rotary Frankston Sunrise (with the support of businesses and individuals who have sponsored and participated in this event), has raised over \$80,000 for Very Special Kids.

BUILDING A SOLID FOUNDATION for our community The Sunrise Foundation took a giant leap forward this quarter with the transfer of the remaining profits from the club's boat shed building program (that had been sitting in Trust at Frankston City Council for some time), transferred to our Foundation Bank Account.

Over the coming years, Rotary Frankston Sunrise via its Sunrise Foundation, will offer a series of local community grants. Under the terms of our Foundation, all monies being required to support and benefit the local Frankston community.

The Foundation Trustees are currently developing the funding criteria, processes and operating model for the grants program, with the support and guidance of those with knowledge in this area.

We will also be looking to ensure much of our supports can go to those smaller organisations making huge local impacts. Beneficiaries will need to be registered with "Deductible Gift Recipient" (DGR) status under the terms of our Trust Deed.

Frankston High School

Interact is a Rotary sponsored community service organisation for secondary school students. It is about supporting student engagement in service, developing teamwork, leadership and personal growth for the students.

Our Interact Club at Frankston High School is a massive success and something Frankston Sunrise can be immensely proud of. Three years in, it is going from strength to strength and is recognised across our District as a shining example of what Interact can be.

Some of what has been achieved in the last year:

- \$5000 for a SkyHydrant in a village in Bhutan
- Interact Bunnings BBQ raising \$2200
- Flag Bearers at the Rotary International 2023 Convention Opening Ceremony
- Attended the House of Friendship at the RI Convention new ideas for future projects
- Collaboration Projects within the school (toothbrush and toothpaste drive to support Asylum Seeker Resource Centre)
- Extra hands to help at our May 27 Bunnings BBQ
- ANZAC Day Dawn Service @ Beauty Park
