OUR HISTORY

Rotary Frankston Sunrise was Chartered by Rotary International in December 1990 and celebrated its 32nd anniversary in January 2023.

It is part of Rotary District 9820 which covers the south eastern region of Melbourne, south through the Mornington Peninsula and east through the Gippsland region.

Since 1990, Rotary Frankston Sunrise has served many local and overseas communities. A selection of projects over the history of the Club include:

- building a house donated to Peter Mac
- refurbishing a house for the Schizophrenia Foundation
- tree and shrub planting in Beauty Park
- creation of mobility gardens at two rehabilitation hospitals
- fitting of planks to the Frankston Foreshore Boardwalk
- construction of three separate beach boxes on Frankston Beach which sold for a profit of well over \$300k with proceeds being used to support local community projects
- construction of school classrooms in Vanuatu
- support and donations of goods and services to countries including Nauru, Tonga, Sri Lanka, Ghana & Timor Leste

Our fundraising initiatives continue to support a diverse range of important local and international charities and projects.

A lot has been achieved in the past 32 years and our club continues to grow and thrive; who knows what the next 32 years and more may hold and the impact our members will have as they work together for the common good.

The students do a great job, have boundless energy and speaking of boundless energy, our teacher coordinator Jon Christie goes above and beyond 7 days a week supporting the indefatigable efforts of our Interactors. Thanks also to my partners in crime, Dave Wilton and Kim Michod for their support, and to the Sunrise Rotarians who have joined us in working alongside and helping mentor the Interactors at various events.

Frankston VFL Footy BBQ

We were asked by Adrian 'Rocky' Lloyd (CEO Frankston Footy Club) to operate a sausage sizzle and sell drinks on the old grandstand side of the ground. So far we have manned five home games and the profits have been a mixed bag (approx \$700 per game); fellowship is the real benefit.

Annual Golf Day

The Golf Day was another fantastic success with nearly \$50K in profits. The committee and volunteers on the day did another amazing job.

McClelland Gallery Artists Retreat Residence

Although not part of Finance and Fundraising, I had the contact with the Builder (Phil McEvoy). This was a great project for the club with most members getting involved in some aspect of the refurbishment. An indigenous group working on local projects were the first artists to take up residence at the retreat.

St John of God Mobility Garden Refurbishment

The club had done the original garden and it was looking very tired, so our landscape architect developed a plan and Warwick and I coordinated the working bee which was a fantastic success. St John of God paid for all plants and materials.

This was a great effort by our club to raise funds to support various programs at Very Special Kids.

MARKETING

This past year Frankston Sunrise made a concerted effort to lift its profile through a coordinated marketing effort via social media, and consolidate its 'brand' within both internal and external communications.

The following marketing initiatives have been implemented in the past 12 months:

- development of brand guidelines that incorporate the blue and yellow in the logo
- consistent messaging/visuals on social media
- design of a new weekly club newsletter that is shared with members and a quarterly newsletter that is uploaded to the website to share with our supporters and the wider community
- new club logo design
- creation of new polo shirts, caps, vests, jackets and banners featuring updated design and clearer club branding for easier recognition
- introduction of reels on social media
- new suite of collateral for Annual Golf Day (fliers, presentation, tickets, information booklet)
- regular posting to social media to promote club activities, achievements and impact
- tagging of peer/partner organisations to increase market/audience reach
- specifically designed social media templates for the following subjects/topics:
 - new members
 - guest speakers
 - educational content
 - community service
 - Interact
 - events

In the past year the club has experienced:

- a 1.7K% increase in facebook page reach (up to 18,564 reach compared to same time last yr)
- 946 facebook page visits (125.8% increase)
- Instagram reach of 235 (a 100% increase)

Marketing is an invaluable tool that will support the ongoing growth and sustainability of the club through improved awareness and engagement plus it provides an opportunity to shine a spotlight on the positive impact our club, and more specifically our members, contribute to our wider community.

ANNUAL CHARITY GOLF DAY

On Monday 20 March, 31 teams (124 golfers) competed for the highly coveted Stuart Woodward Memorial Trophy and raised just shy of \$50,000 through the event.

First Place - team from Shepard Webster & O'Neill Gross Score: 63 Nett Score: 53.25

Runners Up - team from Bayport Group Gross Score: 62 Nett Score: 54.12

Third Place was the combined team from Rolls Australia & Prosperum Wealth Gross Score: 58 Nett Score: 54.25

Unfortunately, our \$50k Hole-In-One prize didn't go off, nor did the two \$1k Travel Voucher Hole-In-Ones (there's always next year) but there were loads of other great prizes won on the day including a weekend use of a Mercedes car, and a fantastic Callaway Driver (that was donated by Drummond Golf Frankston). Our Beneficiary breakfast was held on Wednesday, 3 May at Peninsula Kingswood with funds distributed to Wheelchairs for Kids, Frankston Football Club, Community Support Frankston, Sikh Volunteers Australia, Frankston Community Fund, Mums Supporting Families in Need (MSFIN), and Peninsula Kingswood Community Foundation.

Next year is already booked for Monday 18 March 2024 with planning kicking off soon!









SUNRISE FOUNDATION

There are some exciting times ahead for the Frankston Sunrise Foundation.

As members would know, the remaining profits from our boat shed building program (just under \$300k) have been sitting in Trust at Frankston City Council for some time as various programs had been considered but ultimately rejected ...well those monies are now back in our Foundation Bank Account and we have a plan!

But first, a special vote of thanks and sincere acknowledgement to our Club Treasurer (and pro-bono lawyer!) Jason Coppard for his efforts and unwaverin focus in resolving the terms for the transfer of these funds.

And what is the plan?

Over the coming years, Rotary Frankston Sunrise will offer a series of local community grants. Under the terms of our Foundation, all monies being required to support and benefit the local Frankston community.

Our initial range of grants during the coming year will be for amounts up to \$10k with approximately three to five grants to be made available in the first year.

The Foundation Trustees are currently working out the criteria, processes and operating model for the grants program, with the support and guidance of those with knowledge in the area.

We will also be looking to ensure much of our supports can go to those smaller organisations making huge local impacts. Beneficiaries will need to be registered with "Deductible Gift Recipient" (DGR) status under the terms of our Trust Deed.

All our members are encouraged to get involved in identifying appropriate beneficiaries as we move forward.



Our Interact Club at Frankston High School is a massive success and something Frankston Sunrise can be immensely proud of. Three years in, it is going from strength to strength and is recognised across our District as a shining example of what Interact can be.

So what is Interact?

Interact is a Rotary sponsored community service organisation for secondary school students. It is about supporting student engagement in service, developing teamwork, leadership and personal growth for the students.

As Rotarians, our role is to work with the coordinating teacher in mentoring the students. Most importantly, Interact is set up to be run by the students who determine their service priorities and run their own meetings.

Rotary International has a guideline that Clubs meet fortnightly and undertake two key projects per year:

1.A service project supporting the local or school community2.A project that builds international awareness and understanding

From day one, our Interact teams have wanted more. They meet weekly: they communicate on Microsoft Teams on what seems to be a 24/7 cycle; they manage multiple projects and engage in all sorts of additional activities.

As many of you know, we have been incredibly fortunate to have Jon Christie as our coordinating teacher. Jon has a passion and energy as a teacher and for Interact that it is hard to imagine could be topped. The time he puts into Interact in and out of school hours is phenomenal (some of those we see, giving up weekend days to support the students, many of those hours we don't). Interact at Frankston High would not be what it is without Jon Christie and he has our very sincere thanks.













Interact leadership teams run to the school year, rather than our Rotary year, so this last 12 months we have worked with two different leadership teams. Different styles, different personalities, but consistent across all is their passion, enthusiasm, work ethic, and an determination to achieve a great result.

Particularly exciting is the strength and commitment of our junior school students, a number of who are already occupying key leadership positions and are very focussed on the future of Interact – a future that looks very bright!

- Attended the House of Friendship at the RI Convention – new ideas for future projects
- Collaboration Projects within the school (toothbrush and toothpaste drive to support Asylum Seeker Resource Centre)
- Supported Sunrise activities:
 - Treadmill Challenge
 - Clean Up Australia Day
 - Extra hands at our May 27 Bunnings BBQ
- Supported other Rotary activities:
 - Peninsula 2.0 Duck Derby
 - ANZAC Day Dawn Service @ Beauty Park

Our Interactors have a full 2nd half of the year planned and money already in the bank to support more causes.
