DID YOU KNOW?



Tenugui (bon dance towels) are a staple at every bon dance you go to. They are used during several dance numbers and used as headbands.

The versatility of *tenugui* extends far beyond the bon dance arena. They are used to make *hapi* coats, bento carriers, slings, tote bags, face masks, and quilts, too. People also like to collect them as souvenirs or use them as decorations.

Traditional *tenugui* are made using thin, light white cotton fabric and having designs dyed on to them. They have evolved over time, with many featuring colored fabric with modern designs and undertones. Some are now made out of terry cloth, making them suitable for use as dish or washcloth around the house.

The earliest *tenugui* that is part of HJM's collection was donated to us by Yoshiko Dacanay, who is the daughter of Rev. Kogan Ekuan. They hand printed *tenugui* using different shapes, stamps, and dyes, making each *tenugui* unique from each other. The vintage *tenugui* is currently on display in our dining hall for all to see!

YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED

This month's question relates to one of the services that is observed during Obon.

Question: "What is a Hatsubon service?" - A.W.

Hatsubon is the first Obon service for a person who passed away within the last year. According to Buddhist tradition, Hatsubon is observed at least 49 days after a loved one's passing.

It is believed that the deceased person is on a journey for 49 days after their death before they are reborn. Since Obon is to celebrate the welcoming of the spirits *back* to Earth, those who have not been reborn yet are honored during the following year's Hatsubon service.
