Definitions

Diversity is defined as real and perceived differences among individuals or groups and the ways in which these differences affect interactions and relationships as well as the status of different groups in organisations. The types of differences include general ones of **gender**, **race and ethnicity**, **nationality**, **and sexual orientation** as well as individual differences such as personality. Theoretical and empirical knowledge about diversity draws from several fields, including psychology, social psychology, cognitive psychology, sociology, anthropology, cultural studies, and race and ethnic relations, as well as management. The relevant types of diversity may differ from one country to another, the core issue is how to effectively manage the benefits of diversity and mitigate its negative effects as well as preventing the exclusion and devaluation of members of non-dominant groups. - Stella M Nkomo

Diversity

The practice or quality of including or involving people from a range of different social and ethnic backgrounds and of different genders, sexual orientations, etc

Context

The circumstances that form the setting for an event, statement, or idea, and in terms of which it can be fully understood.

The quality or state of being hypersensitive




Camissa meaning "The place of sweet waters" or "sweet water for all" a river that flows to the ocean.























Transformative Healing through indigenous knowledges

Indigenous Knowledge systems offer a wealth of insights across various disciplines such as:

Traditional games and music	Integrating movement, rhythm and play into learning
Languages	Preserving cultural heritage and optimising self expression
Storytelling and oral traditions	Using legends, myths and oral history to teach cultural values, history and critical thinking
Foraging and Traditional Medicine	Knowledge of local flora and fauna for medicinal use, food and sustainable living
Sustainable farming practices	Using indigenous ecological knowledge to teach environmentally friendly techniques
Rites of Passage	Incorporating initiation ceremonies to mark the stages of life which promotes an instilled sense of belonging and responsibility

Ethnomathematics	Highlighting African contributions to mathematics through spatial design, construction techniques, symbolic systems (eg basketry, sona drawings of Mozambique, weaving , storytelling as mathematical expressions)
African cosmologies	Indigenous perspectives on human existence and the universe
Local History and Geography	Place based education to foster environmental custodianship.
Ecological Activism	Learning about sustainable practices and respect for the environment


