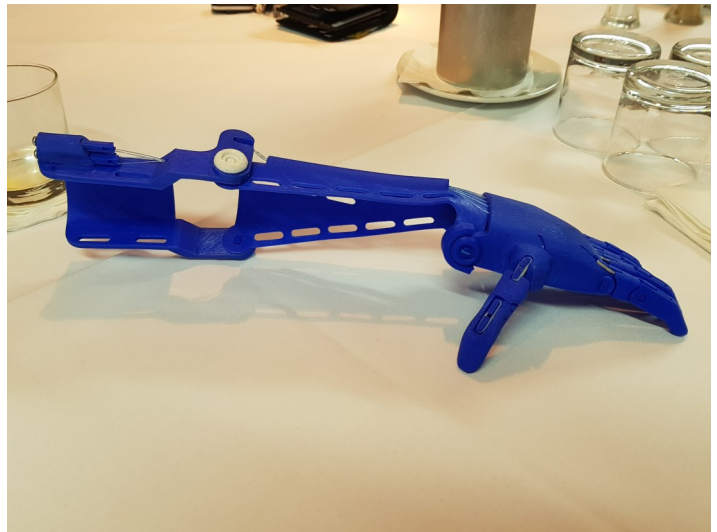

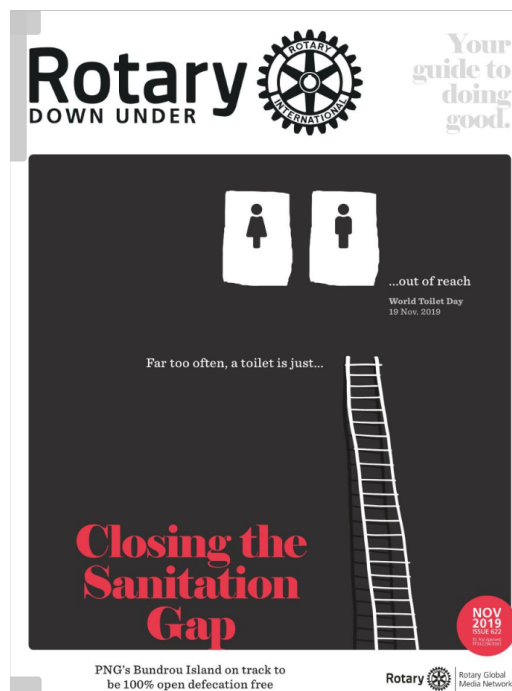

ROTARY & THE UN

A FORMIDABLE FRIENDSHIP


Dear fellow Rotarians and members of the family of Rotary,

Rotary Day at the United Nations, which we celebrate each November, is an important reminder of the historic relationship between our organisations. But this year's event is even more important than usual, because we are building up to the 75th anniversary of the UN Charter in June 2022.

You might ask, why celebrate anniversary? For Rotary, it is appropriate, because we played a critical leadership role in the San Francisco Conference that formed the United Nations in 1945. Through WWII, Rotary published materials on the importance of forming a coalition to preserve world peace.

organisation to preserve world peace. Not only did Rotary help influence the formation of the UN, but *The Rotarian* also played a leading part in communicating its ideals. Rotary educated members about plans to create the UN through numerous articles in *The Rotarian* and through a booklet titled *From Here On!* When the time came to write the UN Charter, Rotary was one of 42 organisations the United States invited to serve as consultants to its delegation at the San Francisco Conference.

Each organisation had seats for three representatives, so Rotary International's 11 representatives



served in rotation. The people officially representing Rotary included the general secretary, the current and several past presidents, and the editor of *The Rotarian*.

In addition, Rotarians from Africa, Asia, Australia, Europe, and North and South America served as members of, or consultants to, their own nation's delegations.

We have a deep and lasting relationship with the UN that deserves to be celebrated and appreciated. To recognise this relationship, Rotary will host five special events between now and June: Rotary Day at the UN in New York on November 9; three presidential conferences next year in Santiago, Chile, in Paris, and in Rome; and a final celebration just before the Rotary International Convention in Monrovia.

The focus on the UN in the year ahead is not only about the past; it also lights a path to our future. There are so many parallels between the work we do through our areas of focus and the work of the UN Sustainable Development Goals. While those goals are indeed incredibly ambitious, they provide inspiration and direction – and are similar to many Rotary goals, which have proven to create lasting, positive change in our world. The goals can be achieved, but only if undertaken with the same long-term commitment and tenacity that Rotary understands so well. Alone, we cannot provide clear

water for all, we cannot eliminate hunger, we cannot eradicate polio. But together, with partners like the United Nations, of course we can.

WHAT DOES YOUR CLUB DO

Many Rotary clubs focus too heavily on fundraising, at the expense of directly serving their community, writes David Campbell.

Over my years in Rotary, I have been introduced to many Rotarians at Rotary-related events. On these occasions I frequently ask, "What does your club do?" In the vast majority of my encounters the first thing they tell me about is their club's fundraising efforts. But my follow-up question, "What else does your club do?", is often met with an awkward silence or a long pause while they dig deep to come with an answer. It is my observation that many clubs too easily see their main purpose as raising money for other organizations. And they are most of their volunteer resources to raise money at the expense of their own. It is time to turn these resources into the unique capacity of each club to become directly involved in serving their community.

So, it should come as no surprise that we are seen in our communities as 'The Bank of Rotary'. Just ask a non-Rotarian what they know about their local Rotary club. I bet they'll tell you that the club raises money for other organisations. Many of these recipient organisations can, and do, carry out their own fundraising and see Rotary only as another funding source.

have also seen fundraising consume most of a club's energy, leaving little left for rolling up their sleeves and engaging personally in service to their community.

When clubs have discontinued a fundraising activity the first thought is almost always, 'What new fundraiser can we undertake?' not 'Let's look at undertaking a hands-on community project or doing a Rotary grant project', for example.

Fundraising can be an important role for a Rotary club, but it shouldn't take the 'self' out of Service Above Self. •

We Are Launching An Interact Club

Early 2020, in a joint venture between Rotary Frankston Sunrise and Peninsula Rotaract, we will launch an Interact Club at Frankston High School!

So what is Interact?

Interact is a key part of Rotary's Youth Programs and is a service club for youth aged 13-18 who want to engage in community service while having fun. There are more than 20,000 Interact Clubs operating in 159 countries around the world.

Students design and implement two projects each year: one for their school or local community, and one that promotes international understanding.

The students run the Club and will make their own decisions as to the projects they undertake. As sponsors of the club, Rotary and Rotaract will act as mentors. The Interact Club will meet 2 lunch times per month at meetings attended by a Rotarian & Rotaract mentor.

For the students, this is a great opportunity to make a difference both locally and internationally. They will develop leadership and organisational skills. They will have the ability to connect with the Rotary & Rotaract network around the world and to engage with Interact Clubs across the globe. It will expand their understanding of issues here and abroad and dovetails in well with the school's overall leadership development agenda. The enthusiastic response received from Frankston High and Principal John Albiston bodes well for the future of Interact at the school.

For the Rotaract Club, it continues to support their own development as community leaders and introduces them and engages them with prospective future Rotaractors. For us at Rotary Frankston Sunrise, it is a great opportunity to engage with emerging young people in the area. It opens a connection with the broader school community and extends our impact both here and abroad.

So preparations for the launch are underway, with an announcement to be made to the students at key assemblies on November 28. The formal launch of the club will happen in late February, early March 2020.

Unfortunately other members could not be present due to holiday and other commitments.

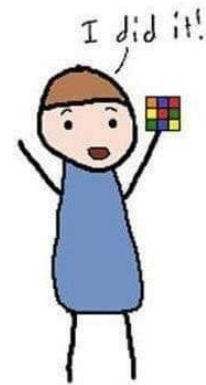
