It was fantastic to again hear from David Kelly the marketing fundraising manager from Very Special Kids. As David is about to leave the organization to take up a teaching position in Japan he brought along his successor Bridgett Johnson (a local girl)who will be taking over and working with us on the Treadmill Challenge project which will raise much needed funding for Very Special Kids.

David outlined what VSK does within our community with their support centres and hospice care facilities caring for over 900 families that have kids with life threatening conditions. It costs approx.. \$9.0m annually to run their programs, with a large percentage of this having to be donations and fundraising.

Our Rotary club will be running a Treadmill Challenge at Joe Russo's Core Fitness centre on Sunday 20th October over 12 Hrs to raise funds for VSK.

As you have heard, we are in early stages of planning for an Interact at a local school in partnership with Peninsula Rotaract. For those that don't know, here's a quick description of what Interact is...

Interact is a service club for youth ages 12 to 18 who want to connect with other young people and have fun while serving their communities and learning about the world.

Clubs, which meet at least twice a month, are sponsored by local Rotary clubs. Interact clubs organize two projects every year, one that helps their school or community and one that promotes international understanding.

Members of sponsor Rotary clubs (and in this case, jointly with Rotaractors) mentor Interactors as they carry out the projects and develop leadership skills. Our hope is to launch a club in time for the 2020 school year. You will be hearing more over the coming months.



We have launched our very own 12 Hour Treadmill Challenge & our guests from Very Special Kids were Dave & Brigitte. Sunday October 20th is the big day & Joe will host the event at Core24 Frankston. Very Special Kids are a wonderful charity providing services to the families of young people with limited life expectancy. They already run a hugely successful 24 Hour Treadmill Challenge in Hawthorn every year, so there is a blueprint for us to follow. Our first task will be to engage sponsors for the 10 treadmills we will use on the day. We already have 3

Paul Harris Fellowships

At our recent Changeover, it was great to celebrate the contribution of Mark Rees via the elevation of his Paul Harris Fellowship to Sapphire status. This is only the 4th time this has occurred in the history of Frankston Sunrise.

But what exactly is a Paul Harris Fellow?

The following is taken from rotary.org

The Paul Harris Fellow recognition acknowledges individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name, of \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation.

Rotary established the recognition in 1957 to encourage and show appreciation for substantial contributions to what was then the Foundation's only program, Rotary Foundation Fellowships for Advanced Study, the precursor to Ambassadorial Scholarships.

Early Paul Harris Fellows received a certificate of recognition. In 1969, the Foundation unveiled the first Paul Harris Fellow medallion at the Rotary Convention in Honolulu. Japanese metal artist Fiju Tsuda created the piece under the direction of former Foundation Trustee Kyozo Yuasa. Today, Paul Harris Fellows receive a certificate and pin. They are also eligible to buy a Paul Harris Fellow medallion.

Rotarians have a tradition of supporting the Foundation by honoring others. (This has become an important tradition for Frankston Sunrise)

The Sapphire Pin was introduced in 1984, with the blue-stone Multiple Paul Harris Fellow pin recognizing additional donations up to \$5,000.

Frankston Sunrise has 4 Sapphire Paul Harris Fellows: Bill Blythe, Ross Augustine, David McKenzie and now, Mark Rees.
