

Simple Strokes




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What does the sign define?

Plucking one or more courses of strings in a downward direction

Only One String




- Plucking one string of course
- Plectrum in erect position 45 degrees to the upper part of the soundboard

Rested



- No official sign yet developed by F.K. Rumpf
- Plectrum rests after a downstroke over both strings of one course on the top string of the course below

Two Strings



What does the sign define?

Plectrum plucks both strings of a course in one motion downward

PARAMETERS OF A STROKE 1

How Many Strings

- How big does the motion have to be
- Do I have to pay closer attention before, or after the stroke to not pluck another string
- Do I have to pay attention to melody lines

The Motion's Scale

- Is our motion stopped by a string
- Do we have to stop it ourselves
- Do we want it to be stopped
- How much motion before the stroke

Where To Stroke

- Where between finger of the left hand and bridge do we stroke
- When doing down strokes on more than course - do we stroke stroke every string in the same place



- Plectrum in straight, or erect position

PARAMETERS OF A STROKE 2

Hanging, Straight, Erect

- How big does the motion have to be
- Do I have to pay closer attention before, or after the stroke to not pluck another string
- Do I have to pay attention to melody lines

Volume

- A Note in Forte needs a bigger motion
- A note in Piano needs a lighter motion
- Is the volume regular or irregular?

The Pitch

- How much space is between the finger of the left hand and the place where the plectrum strokes
- On what string do we play

2 Strings Down & Up

Rested

1 String Down & Up

2 Strings Down & Up 1





- Plucking one or more courses of strings in every direction
- Plectrum in a straight position
- Is also used as sign for an up stroke plucking both strings of one course with a plectrum in a straight position

2 Strings Down & Up 2





- Plucking two strings of one course in every direction
- Plectrum in a straight position

Rested





- Plucking one or more courses of strings in every direction
- Plectrum in a straight position
- Plectrum rests after every stroke on the next string

1 String Down & Up





- Plucking one string of course
- Plectrum in erect position 45 degrees to the upper part of the soundboard

PLECTRUM POSITIONS 1

Hanging

 Plectrum in hanging position - 45 degrees to the lower part of the soundboard

Straight

Plectrum in straight position - 90 degrees to the soundboard

Erect

 Plectrum in erect position - 45 degrees to the upper part of the soundboard



2 or more Down & 1 Up 1 Down & 2 or more Up 0 ne Rested

2 or more Down & 1 Up





- Plucking one or more courses of strings in one Down Stroke
- Plucking only one string of one course in the Up Stroke
- Plectrum in a hanging position

1 Down & 2 or more Up





- Plucking one string of a course in the Down Stroke
- Plucking one or more courses in the Up Stroke
- Plectrum in a erect position

Rested









- Resting on the next string on the Down or the Up Stroke
- Plectrum in a straight position

PLECTRUM POSITIONS 2

Tilted

• The plate of the plectrum is parallel to the floor


Parallel

• The plate of the plectrum is parallel to the strings of a course

Tipped

• The plate of the plectrum is nearly perpendicular to the floor


