This year's 8-hr Treadmill/Exercise Bike Challenge raised an incredible \$31,123 for Very Special Kids. We are blown away by this result; what a phenomenal community we have.

On Sunday September 10th at Core24 Frankston, seven 'teams' took to the treadmill and bikes from 9am-5pm to raise money and awareness for the work done by Very Special Kids supporting children who are living with a life threatening illness, as well as their families.

Over the past four years, Rotary Frankston Sunrise (with the support of businesses and individuals who have sponsored and participated in this event), has raised in total over \$110,000 for Very Special Kids. We think that's AMAZING!
