# 10DO WISSION OF HAWAII

#### Message by Bishop Kosen Ishikawa

Dear Members and Friends of Jodo Mission,

Thank you very much for your support and understanding during this difficult time of pandemic. As Governor Ige commended the people in Hawaii, we have done a good job so far by following the strict emergency rules such as staying-at-home order. Though I feel sorry for many people who have been victims of this pandemic, the spread of Covid-19 has now slowed down and Hawaii is getting ready to be a safer place. More Hawaii businesses are permitted to reopen on May 7 (Kauai & Hawaii Island) by the latest "Safer-at-home" proclamation by the Governor. However, our temple, so-called "place of worship" is not allowed to reopen yet and we need to be more patient.

About a decade ago, when Koloa Jodo Mission temple was under renovation as a centennial project, I had a chance to climb up at the very top-roof. The roof was very high and steep but had great views. I enjoyed taking photos of unusual sceneries from the roof. When I came down, Mr. Hattori, the master carpenter from Japan, taught me something very interesting. He asked me, "Aren't you frightened to be at such a high place?" I replied, "Yes, I was very scared."

Then he told me, "I'm glad to hear you felt scared. You will not be falling down as long as you don't forget the feeling of being scared. The one who apt to fall down is usually the guy who has no fear at all."

This reminded me of a short episode which was written by **Yoshida Kenko** about 700 years ago. He was a Buddhist monk but was famous as an essayist. His collection of essays called "Tsurezuregusa" has been a very popular book in Japan. The title of this episode is "A Famous Tree Climber" in Tsurezure-gusa.

Once upon a time, there lived a famous man called "Master of Tree Climber." When he ordered his men to climb high on the tree to trim some branches, he said nothing to them while they were working at dangerous positions on the tree.

It was when they came down to the lower position, he finally warned his men, "Pay attention! Be careful about getting down" while it didn't look dangerous at all. Then, the author Yoshida Kenko who was watching this, asked the master" Why did you give them warning in such a safe position? I thought they could jump easily." Then master replied,

"Good question! I didn't say anything when they were working at high and dangerous position because they knew they had to be careful. But mistakes or failures always happen when people think it's Ok and safe." The author continued to make comments, "Though he may not be a noble man, but I thought he was telling the same truth that ancient saints left to us."

The reason why I share this story with you is because now is the time we need to be extra careful about Covid-19. As Hawaii is getting back to be safer, we need to realize the feeling of security could be the greatest enemy. So, let us all continue to do our part such as washing hands well and frequently, wearing cloth covering at the required places, having social distancing and avoid any social gatherings of more than 10 people and so on.

Last, but not least, please feel free to let us know if you need spiritual assistance and help. We, ministers, and staffs are here to serve you. And we continue to pray for your good health and safety of everyone.

#### Bishop's Message in Japanese

2009年3月のことです。コロア浄土院旧本堂の修理で、屋根のてっぺんに登って写真を 撮っていた時、大工棟梁の服部親方から面白いことを教えてもらいました。

親方「先生は高いところ平気?」

私「いえいえ、平気じゃないです。すごく怖いです。」

親方「怖いなら大丈夫。先生は落ちないよ。時々、高いところでも平気な大工がいるけど、そういう怖いもの知らずの者が、落ちる傾向がある。恐怖心を持っていると用心するでしょ。何事も油断は大敵。|

面白いことに、約700年前の有名な随筆「徒然草」にも、このような油断大敵を説いている逸話があります。その章の題名は「高名の木登り」。 著者吉田兼好が、実際に木登りの名人から見聞きした 「なるほど!」といった内容です。

ある時、木登り名人が、 見習いを高い木に登らせて、梢を切らせたときのこと。 人が見ていて、はらはらするぐらい高いところで仕事をしている時には、 一言も発しなかった名人が、軒の低さにまで降りてきた段になって、はじめて「気をつけて降りなさい」と言ったといいます。 その一部始終を見ていた著者の兼好法師が、「あれぐらいの高さだったら、ジャンプしても安全に降りられるのに、なんで、あのタイミングで言ったのですか?」と名人に尋ねたところ、 名人は、「目がまわるほどの高さでは、たとえ誰に言われなくても注意はする。でも、ミスというのは、「大丈夫、危なくない」と思ったときに起きるものなんだ」 と言ったそうです。

兼好法師は、この一言に深く感銘をうけ、

「名人はたとえ身分は低いかもしれないが、言っていることは古の聖人が言い残したことと同じだ」と書き残しました。

これが「高名の木登り」です。 この話を、一言で言い表すと「油断大敵」になると思いますが、 英語では、"Security is the greatest enemy." (直訳では、Security(安心)は最大の敵)と言い表しています。

皆様ご存知のように、ハワイは新型コロナウィルスの世界的流行下で、厳しい規制と法令で臨んできました。勿論、経済的な損失は大きく今も困難な状況は続いていますが、多くの人の協力で新規感染者数の減少に成功しつつあります。先般、ハワイ州イゲ知事の発表により、ハワイ経済の段階的な再開もはじまりました。しかし、より安全な印象をもつことで、気がゆるみがちです。こういう時だからこそ、木登り名人にならい、注意を怠ることなく、引き続き、手洗いやマスク、社会的距離をとるなど、一人一人ができることを継続して実行していきましょう。

末筆ですが、皆様とご家族の御健康を心より祈念申し上げます。



### Introduction of Sho-ryo Dana in O-Bon

- 1) **Incense:** Purify the area of Sho-ryo Dana with the smoke of incense
- 2) **Flower:** Flower is a symbol of purity. There are numerous flowers in the Pure Land.
- 3) Water: Water is a symbol of offering. The offered water is called "AKA" that is translated from a Sanskrit word "Argha", the most valuable thing.
- 4) **Candle**: A candle light is showing us the light of wisdom and compassion of Amida Buddha.
- 5), 6) Cucumber and Eggplant with sticks: With a Cucumber, make a horse (using sticks) for your ancestors to return home early. Make a cow with an Eggplant (using sticks) for them to return to the Pure Land slowly.
- 7) **Mizu-noko**: The fresh cut eggplant and cucumber with washed rice. Offering food in prayer to help everyone from hunger in any realms. (Optional)
- 8) Some rice in a bowl of Water and a leaf of Lythrum ancepts: This expands food limit-lessly. (Optional)
- Nishime without meat: A traditional Japanese food used as monasterial food called Sho-jin Ryo-ri.
- **10) Somen noodle:** Somen noodle is a symbolic food for longevity.
- **11) Fruits and vegetables**: Offer gifts of nature to Buddha and ancestors.
- **12) Mochi or any favorite food:** Offer gifts of nature to Buddha and ancestors.
- **13) Bamboo grass:** Protection to keep away the bad spirits from the Sho-ryo Dana.



## Due to Coronavirus, we have changed our procedures regarding Makuragyo, or last rites, funerals and inurnments, 49 day service:

Our ministers can conduct these services at your request, however with no attendees. If with attendees, we can do these services for 10 or less attendees, everyone wears a facial mask, social distance of 6 feet and no one touches their face with unclean hands. This is for the protection of our ministers, as well as the deceased's family members. Services with or without attendees can be conducted by telephone, skype or other agreeable means so family will be able to participate in the service. This is especially helpful for family living out of state and Hawaii's 14-day isolation when traveling. This is also helpful for large families who find it difficult to have only 10 people attend a funeral. In the case of no attendees, the family could at the time of the scheduled service light a senko at their home altar or in the case of a funeral, it can be done at the gravesite followed by inurnment. Although some families may want to postpone the funeral to a later time, however, because of the current situation, it may not happen for a long time.
