### What are your Interests outside of art?

I MOVED BACK TO THE SEASIDE RECENTLY AND NOW SPEND A LOT OF MY TIME SWIMMING, WALKING ON THE BEACH, HORSE-RIDING AND TRYING TO FIX MY OLD, CRUMBLING HOUSE. I AM VERY MUCH AN INTROVERT SO I DO A LOT OF QUIET STUFF ON MY OWN LIKE READING, LISTENING TO MUSIC AND WATCHING FILMS. I HAVE TURNED INTO MUCH MORE OF AN ACTIVIST IN THE PAST FEW YEARS PROBABLY AS A REACTION TO THESE APPALLING TORY GOVERNMENTS AND I AM VERY MUCH INTO PROTECTING THE ENVIRONMENT, CHAMPIONING WOMEN'S RIGHTS AND BUILDING A MORE EQUAL SOCIETY, SO I KEEP MYSELF INFORMED ON THESE TOPICS AS MUCH AS I CAN.

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## What is your Inspiration for the painting 'Le Printemps' ?

THE INSPIRATION FOR THE ONE WITH THE TWO LADIES: I CALLED THIS PAINTING 'LE PRINTEMPS'



(WHICH MEANS 'THE SPRING' IN FRENCH). I WAS THINKING ABOUT THE IDEA OF TRANSFORMATION AND GROWING ON A PERSONAL LEVEL. I ALWAYS SEE FLOWERS AS A SYMBOL OF HOPE, NEW LIFE AND A COMBINATION OF STRENGTH AND FRAGILITY. I PAINTED THIS IN THE WINTER WHEN IT WAS REALLY COLD AND GREY AND I WAS DAYDREAMING OF THE COMING SPRING SO I WANTED TO PAINT SOMETHING REALLY BRIGHT TO BRING LIGHT THROUGH THE PAINTING TO A REALLY GREY DAY. I HAVE MADE A LOT OF CHANGES IN MY LIFE IN THE PAST FEW

YEARS, LIKE MOVING TO THE SEASIDE, AND I HAVE BEEN RECOVERING FROM HEALTH ISSUES SO THIS WAS ALSO ABOUT THINKING ABOUT RECOVERING FROM DARK DAYS AND MOVING FORWARD, THE IMPORTANCE OF FRIENDSHIP AND ENJOYING EVERY MOMENT IN LIFE.

#### Tell me a bit more about your piece 'Masculin, Feminin'...

The inspiration for the other one, 'Masculin, Feminin' was about gender stereotypes. Particularly a story when I went into a charity shop last year to buy some clothing that I could wear in my studio while painting. I ending up getting a shirt from the men's section of the shop as it looked like the kind of comfortable stuff that I would be able to move freely into when I was painting. The staff member behind the till was very surprised I had picked up this item and told me twice that this was a 'man's shirt'. I said to me it was 'just a shirt'... It got me thinking about how we still expect men and women to look and behave a certain way and the painting is a humorous reflection on this.
