### Hatsubon In-Person O-Bon Services (3) on August 22, 2020:



at 10:00 am, 2:00 pm and 3:00 pm (Limit of 42 people each service with social distance of 6 feet)

If too many people are in the Social Hall, you may be asked to wait outside—safe distance of 6 feet and with mask. no long conversations, and no touching of eyes, nose and mouth with unclean hands.



# Message by Bishop Kosen Ishikawa

Aloha Members and Friends,

Thank you very much for your support to our temple during this pandemic. I also thank you for your patience and understanding for the closure of our temple and our limited services. We restarted in-person Sunday Service by following the official orders and guidelines. Although what we can do for you is still limited, we try to do our best for you and for the community.



Last month, Governor Ige presented us the road map toward reopening Hawai'i. Although nothing is certain about this pandemic yet, it was at least good to know Hawai'i Businesses and activities were reopened slowly and steadily with care. Then I noticed an unusual word "New Normal" which imply something that was abnormal before, become commonplace.

Needless to say, we all wish to be back to normal life, and we wish to leave this abnormal life as soon as possible. But no matter how we miss life before this pandemic, no matter what we complain or what we hope, this hard reality won't be changed. It is through the actions that we can change our reality in the future.

I believe one of the right actions during this time is to follow the orders such as safer-at-home order, social distancing, wearing face covering, washing hands often, avoiding large groups and so on. Our Governor reiterated that Hawai'i continues to do great because most people are accepting personal responsibility toward the orders. He even assured that recent increase in cases was expected under the road map toward the new normal.

I remember TSA security screening at the airport before 9/11 incident, was easy, simple and quick. Everybody was allowed to go inside the terminal in order to send off or welcome our guests and families at the boarding gate. But 9/11 changed this normal forever. The screening became very strict and more time and restrictions were required for air traveling. Then non-passengers cannot access to the boarding gate anymore. All of a sudden, we were all forced to experience new normal which was unusual before. I recalled strict screenings at the airport was like a burden and I didn't like it. But it was also true that I was so accustomed to the new normal without knowing it.

Fortunately, we human beings have ability to get used to the new situation and passing time makes us forget what we didn't like. So we don't need to worry about this new normal in the future. And we should not stick to the old normal because old normal was not always good. Now is the time to build up better new normal with positive thoughts. I'm more than confident that Buddhist teachings will help us greatly to get over this difficult time.

One of the positive feedbacks I received from our members was my online Services. Because of this pandemic, I was able to know some of you and have new connections with them through the internet. Also I'm grateful that I had some chances to conduct memorial services to our members from Kauai. I will continue to provide online services and Buddhist teachings through my YouTube, SNS, and [www.koloajodo.com](http://www.koloajodo.com). So if you need spiritual assistance, please feel free to contact me. I'll be more than happy to serve you whether online or in-person. Last, but not least, I pray for your good health and safety. And "Namu Amida Butsu" to you and to your beloved ones.

## Message by Rev. Kanjun Nakano

The late minister Rev. Narashiba and I would often have private seminars with only two of us. We often argued with each other. I learned a lot from Narashiba sensei.

This message is written by Rev. Nakano who learned a lot from Narashiba sensei.



### Summary of 49 Days

When somebody passed away, the soul will never die. For the soul, there are two worlds to enter after the death. One is the world of Jodo or Pure Land of Amida Buddha. Another one is the world of reincarnation or Circling Life. If one falls into the Circling Life, the person has to take judgments every seven days and this must be done seven times.

The First judgment is as follows: On the way of 7 judgments, there is a river which is called San Zu no Kawa. San means three and Zu means ways. There are three ways to go across the river. They are a bridge, a shallow way and a muddy deep way. At the first 7<sup>th</sup> day service, we chant the sutra and ask Amida Buddha to take the deceased person to the bridge, which is the easiest one.

The Second judgment is as follows: At the end of the bridge over San Zu no Kawa, an old man and old woman are waiting for the person. They take off the clothes of the deceased person and hang them on a branch of a willow tree. If the branch bends down and if the clothes fall down, the person will fall into the Hell. At the 14<sup>th</sup> day service, we chant the sutra to ask Amida Buddha not to let the branch bend down.

Next, one will go to the Third judgment where one will be asked about adulterous thoughts and actions. If he did commit sin, the cat would bite to give suffering. If she did commit sin, the snake would bite to give suffering. By chanting the sutra, we ask Amida Buddha not to let any cat or snake bite him/her.

The Fourth judgment, one will be asked about the lies that one have committed. Then one finally reaches the Fifth judgment. There Judge Enma makes a judgment on all of your sins. In front of the person, there is a round shining mirror called “Jo-hari”. Judge Enma asks you about your sins one by one, and if you answer truthfully and admit your sin, you will be allowed to pass on. If you lie, the mirror shows you the past event as it actually happened like a video. Then Judge Enma pulls out your tongue and you are sent to Hell. At the 35<sup>th</sup> day service, we will ask Amida Buddha not to let the deceased give any wrong answer to Judge Enma.

The Sixth judgment is the easiest one among the seven judgments. It is the examination of documents up until this time. The judge will make sure there is no mistake in those reports. At the 42<sup>nd</sup> day service, we ask Amida Buddha not to let any mistake happen in those reports.

Finally one reaches the 49<sup>th</sup> day at the Seventh judgment. There will be six gates standing in front of the person. Each one of the gates is the entry to one of the six worlds. However, those gates are all the same in colors and shapes. In front of those gates, he is wondering which gate he should take. You have to choose one of these gates. It seems you choose the gate of future reincarnation by chance, but this decision is made by Judge Taisen from the very beginning. During this time, if someone (family and priest) sincerely pray for the deceased, Amida Buddha may take you to the Pure Land before you choose the gate. Therefore, it is very important to have the 49<sup>th</sup> day service on or before the actual 49<sup>th</sup> day. **However, what is more important is to practice Nenbutsu in our daily life, so that we don't need to go through the 7 judgments at all.**

Narashiba sensei, thank you very much. I appreciate your excellent teachings.

## **More Information About O-Bon**

**Visitations to Your O-Tobas in Social Hall:** We ask for your kokua and patience when visiting your O-Tobas because of social distancing and not having too many people in our Social Hall at one time. Please allow extra time. You may be asked to wait if there are too many people inside the Social Hall. *Thank you for your cooperation and patience.*

**Offerings at your O-toba:** This year like last year the space allowed for each O-toba is approximately 4 inches width and 12 inches in depth. Many family members visit the O-tobas and bring offerings. Some are very organized and stack their offerings neatly in layers. Most people will offer foods that the deceased liked, i.e. fruits, mochi, pastries, candies, somen for long generation life, juice, soda. **Since we will be indoors, we recommend that you please be careful with your potted plants and make sure there is a tray underneath the plant.**



**Jodo Mission has vases or bottles you may use to put your cut flowers. They will be near the sink by the red gingers near the Hawaii Mission School wall (sea side).**

**Offerings of cucumber and eggplant:** Some people will have a cucumber and an eggplant on wooden sticks telling our ancestors to quickly come back to this world via the cucumber (horse) and to slowly return to the Pure Land via the eggplant (cow) and see you again next year.



**Offering of Rice:** During O-Bon Services it is customary to offer a bag of rice. However, monetary donations in lieu of rice are acceptable. "Rice" envelopes are available in the office. Thank you for your understanding and support.

**No Potted Mums Will Be Sold:** Due to Coronavirus and lack of manpower, Sr. YBA decided not to sell potted mums.

**VOLUNTEERS NEEDED:** We are in need of many volunteers during the two weeks the O-Tobas will be displayed in the Social Hall. Most of our volunteers are elderly but with COVID-19 we need the elderly, especially those with health issues, to take care of themselves. Volunteers needed for sanitizing, assisting people find their O-Tobas, monitors to make sure we do not have too many people in the Social Hall, directing people to restrooms, making sure people waiting outside have social distancing, and are wearing facial masks, etc. **If anyone has any time they can spare, please contact the temple office at 949-3995 with your contact info and someone will call you back**

**Volunteers also needed on O-Toba Set Up Date (Aug 9 @ 8am) and O-Toba Kuzushi or Take Down Day (Aug 23 @ 8am). Please call temple office if you are able to help on those days. Thank you.**

**FACIAL MASKS:** *It is important that you wear facial masks and that you cover your nose too.* By not covering your nose, you can inhale bad germs from a person next to you or close to you or someone passing by.
