Historical Symptomatology

January 10, 1920 was the official implementation of the Treaty of Versailles and the founding of the League of Nations. The following decades saw the rearmament of Germany, the Second World War and the establishment of the United Nations 1946. 100 years later, as a result of the 2020 pandemic, it is said that 50% of small businesses in Europe now face bankruptcy. In March 2020, the US Federal Reserve Bank granted more than \$3 trillion in loans and asset purchases to again, as in 2008, stabilize the economic system.

Twenty-First Century Plans: 'Agenda 21' (the United Nations blueprint for socio-economic development for the twenty first century), was established as far back as the 1992 'Earth Summit' in Rio de Janeiro: updated as 'Sustainable Development Goals 2030', or '2050: how the world will look'. Aligned with Sustainable Development 2030, the Coronavirus crisis accelerates 'The Fourth Industrial Revolution'. The longerterm view: that a sociopolitical system might be capable of accommodating man and the spiritual world.

The meta-political ghosts of Rome: With Coronavirus, the US election and the longer-term plans of the United Nations, we are reminded of the play Julius Caesar by William Shakespeare, a meditation on history and alchemy. Caesar says to the Soothsayer 'The ides of March have come'— whereby the soothsayer replies 'Aye Caesar but not gone'. Notably, Julius Caesar was Pontifex Maximus (chief high priest) of Rome yet at the same time priest of the temple of Vesta, goddess of the home and hearth.
