2019-20 President's Report

As a club, we have an excellent history and reputation in relation to the contribution we make to our local and broader international communities. Our members know how to make a difference and we know how to have some fun as we do it. It is the commitment, enthusiasm and humour of our members that continues to make our club an excellent one to be a part of.

We were able to continue some of the great traditions of Frankston Sunrise. But we were also able to try some new things, in some cases by choice and others, forced upon us by circumstance. It is that energy and support that continues to put the club in an excellent place as it looks to the year ahead.

So a recap on some of the highlights of our Rotary year:

- the club continued in supporting the great work of Community Support Frankston
- we had a partner's dinner and attended the Comedy for a Cause night in support of the iMatter Foundation
- under Laurie's careful planning, we continued the long-established tradition of the Grand Final Eve Lunch at the MCG
- on Sunday, 20th October Mark Rees led us, together with the support of Joe Russo in our inaugural 12 hr



Treadmill Challenge in support of Very Special Kids. Raising over \$22,000 our aim is to continue again this year depending on what Covid-19 throws at us.



- Mark and his team put together an excellent program of speakers representing diverse subjects, organisations and projects such as Very Special Kids, medicinal cannabis, Groomed To Go, Dogs For Kids With Disabilities, Michael Ellis talked footy with a forever footy-mad audience, Bindi Mulligan talking about running a field hospital in Iraq and many other fascinating subjects beyond that. We heard from great young people we had sponsored on Rotary leadership and development programs in Australia and even one to the UK. We also heard of a variety of club members' "Traveller's Tales" – up until we were all no longer allowed to travel!

In October, some 50 members and partners came together at a function at Bunerong Restaurant to award the first David "Bluey" Bellette Memorial Bursary to a Plumbing Apprentice. Fittingly, it was awarded to an outstanding female apprentice at Chisholm Tafe, Amelia (Millsy) Schouts.

- We put onions under sausages at Bunnings and look forward to returning to that at some stage.



- Through the Foundation, we were also able to donate a total of \$10,000 towards the Gippsland Fire Relief Appeal.

A Charter member, it was a great honour to be able to award a Sapphire PHF to Dr Laurie at a very well attended farewell function at CBH in Mt Eliza. With the loss of 3 members, we were also fortunate to welcome 3 new members who are already making their mark on the club. Robert Maitz, Warwick Smith and Sherif Balic are outstanding new members of the Sunrise family so notwithstanding the difficulties of the year, we finish with the membership at the same level as last year.

A subject which I was and remain passionate about is improving our public profile and how we communicate ourselves. We made some great starts, but there is plenty more still to go. On this front, we achieved:

- our new look Sunrise Times, as a result of the great work of editor, Robert Maitz. A new look, a fresh approach to content, it gave members an informative look at what the club had in store and reporting on our achievements, with some fun content to keep us entertained as well
- we overhauled and updated our Facebook presence



- we produced a new flyer to assist in our efforts to attract members
- we launched an updated and new look website at www.rotaryfrankstonsunrise.org.au
- we've made a very tentative start on a new database approach to managing the broader Sunrise network. There is a long way to go on making this really work, however it is something that I will look to continue driving over the year ahead.

Interact
Frankston High School



Together with Peninsula Rotaract Club, we reached an agreement with Frankston High School to launch an Interact Club and had planned to kick off in March this year. With the enthusiastic support of John Albiston the school's principal and key staff members, the school had already enlisted great support from the student leadership team when, like with so many things this year, Covid-19 stepped in to delay the launch. I'm pleased to report that in the background, the school and students have continued working towards recruiting a membership base and identifying some initial project priorities. Covid-willing, we will formally establish an Interact Club at Frankston High in Term 3, 2020.

There was also massive effort and energy poured into the planning for major projects like our Golf Day and Ghana Ball. With these major club initiatives postponed until 2021, I want to recognise the enormous effort that was put into these key projects by everybody concerned. It was incredibly disappointing not to be able to go ahead and in the case of the golf day, that decision was literally made nine days before. As you would expect from Sunrise, the commitment for all these projects in 2021 is stronger than ever.

We then turned attention to something we never expected and that was to run our meetings online as Zoom meetings. Some members surprised even themselves by mastering the technology of camera and microphone to be able to join us on a weekly basis. It was an extremely important part of keeping us all connected during the lockdown period. We had some speakers, we had some trivia quizzes (embarrassing for some!), but most of all we were able to see and hear each from other at a time when it would have been very easy to drift apart. We are all champing at the bit to get back to our regular breakfast meetings, but Zoom has proved to be a very effective weapon in maintaining the strength of Frankston Sunrise this year.



So to some thankyou's—To my board, for your continuing support, energy and commitment, thank you so much. To all our club members, their partners and families, you are what makes Frankston Sunrise the great club that it is. As president, you cannot achieve anything without this support, and I am extremely grateful for all the support I have received this past 12 months.

We also cannot forget the wonderful support we receive from our sponsors and supporters of our major initiatives. The expressions of encouragement we have received throughout this year from these individuals and companies has been tremendous.


meetings. Fellowship was predominantly managed by David Morgan whose enthusiasm is a big factor in gathering numbers for each event, all of which went very well.


Sadly we lost three members this year, but on a very positive note we gained three extremely keen new younger members.

DISASTER AID AUSTRALIA:


