BODHI DAY



Bodhi Day is a significant Buddhist holiday that celebrates the day Siddhartha Gautama, also known as Shakyamuni, or Buddha, attained enlightenment.

It is observed annually on December 8th, with Buddhist temples around the world holding services on or near this date. This holiday commemorates Buddha's enlightenment, when he discovered the truths of life, the causes of suffering, and the path to inner peace after 49 days of meditation under a bodhi tree. Bodhi Day is a time for Buddhists to reflect on Buddha's teachings, practice meditation, and express gratitude for his wisdom.

People often celebrate by lighting candles or symbolizing colorful lights, the light of enlightenment, and some may prepare traditional foods like sweet rice or tea. It's a mindfulness. peaceful dav focused on compassion, and understanding.

NATSU OSAKO 100TH ANNIVERSARY NENKI MEMORIAL SERVICE

In March of 1899, Natsu and Sengoro Osako left the small fishing village of Ushima in Yamaguchi Prefecture and joined thousands of their countrymen in pursuit of a better life in the sugar cane fields of Hawaii.

They made their home first in the Overend Camp in Honokaa where their eight children were born and later moved to Paauhau. It was not long before the Hamakua Jodo Mission became a regular part of family life. Eldest daughter Yaeno married Eizuchi Higaki who helped to carve the HJM altar shrine and koa transoms.

Eldest son Yoshikazu was a featured member of the sangha in the 1934 publication *Yōjō no Hikari* published by the Hawaii Jodo Mission. Other marriages and funerals followed including the one for Natsu, who died in Paauhau on October 21, 1925. She was laid to rest in the HJM cemetery.

Because Natsu died relatively young, all but one of her children were still alive in 1974 when they all returned to the Hamakua Jodo Mission for her 50-year *nenki*.

Fifty years later, on October 26, 2024, 33 members of the Osako family spanning four generations gathered at HJM for her 100-year *nenki* which was officiated by former HJM minister Reverend Junshin Miyazaki of Hilo Meishoin.

Returning to HJM for this momentous occasion brought to mind the contributions and sacrifice of our earlier generations, and for this, we are grateful. *Okagesama-de.*

We are excited to welcome her to the Executive Team and look forward to utilizing her expertise as an educator to engage and inspire the younger generation in promoting HJM's mission and legacy. DID YOU KNOW?



Did you know that Charles "Charlie" Sadami Nishimura, a beloved HJM member of the past and former Kyodan President, did a five-part oral history interview in 1999 that is part of the Japanese American Military History Collective Database?

Charlie was born on December 2, 1913, and grew up in Paauhau. Many remember him for his work at the sugar plantation, his 20 years as a Boy Scout Master, and his active involvement at our temple. However, what some may not know is that he was drafted into the Army at the age of 28 on December 10, 1940, during World War II, and served with the distinguished 100th Infantry Battalion.

During his interview, Charlie shared fond memories of his childhood in Paauhau, his experiences in combat during the war, and his life after returning to Hawaii - getting married, starting a family, retiring, and eventually moving to Oahu.
