MESSAGE FROM BISHOP KOSEN ISHIKAWA

Dear Members and Friends of Jodo Mission

It's been over one year since we moved from Kauai. One of the first things my wife and I did after moving here was to plant papaya seeds. As we started a new life here in Honolulu, we wanted to sow the seeds that would produce fruits. Last October, I noticed the very first flower of my papaya plant bloomed and now in March, we are about to harvest the very first fruit. You may wonder why I planted the papaya first, and I would like to tell you why.



Since 2007, gardening has been a hobby I have been very much into. Gardening was what I started before I fell in love with water lilies. I cultivated land and planted vegetables and various fruits including dragon fruit. I enjoyed growing plants and still do now. Then in August, I brought some crops to the Kauai County Farm Bureau Fair for the contest, where I got blue ribbon awards. Among them, I loved papaya plants because they are easy to grow here in Hawaii. The fruit had so many seeds to sow after eating. All the papaya seeds from the fruit are free and have the potential to yield multiple fruits. Have you ever guessed and counted the number of papaya seeds?

Recently, I had a quiz to ask our members to guess the number of papaya seeds during Sunday Service. It took me about 20 minutes to count all the papaya seeds. To our surprise, the answer was 871 seeds in one papaya.

Back when I was living in Kauai, I planted many papaya plants from the seeds. Later I transplanted sprouts on the ground from the pots they once grew in. That's how I got many papaya trees. I enjoyed growing the papaya plants and shared them with others who were interested. Interestingly, a few years later, one of the older ladies I gave the papaya plant in a pot came back to me to report that the papaya plant was now producing sweet papaya. She thanked me a lot and later she joined our membership. Of course, papaya may not be the main reason for her to be our member, but this experience made me realize the importance of Dana (giving) as a source of happiness.

It is my sincere wish that I want to be the person who can always give "something." Of course, as I'm a Jodo Buddhist minister, I would like to share the practice of Nenbutsu and Buddhist teachings with you first and foremost of all. But I would like to share more. That's my motivation to grow papaya and water lilies here at Jodo Mission. The papayas are not ready to share but I also grow many water lilies to give to our members for free. Before selling at the bazaar, please let me know if you would like to grow water lilies. I'll be delighted to give you plants.

As you know, April is when we celebrate the Hanamtsuri Festival in commemoration of the Buddha's birth. At the same time, it is the month when plants begin to sprout. Let us sow the seeds for the future. And please remember that no matter how old you may be, you can always sow the seed! The best seed is absolutely Nenbutsu or to recite "Namu Amida Butusu" because the seed of Nenbutsu will surely bloom in the Pure Land without fail.


Youth Retreat was held in Haleiwa on Sunday, March 12. It was so lively with 24 persons from

VISION FOR THE FUTURE (5)

Japanese Buddhism in Hawaii has a very unique cultural background. In Japan, Buddhist customs differ from village to village, town to town, prefecture to prefecture. This is because Buddhism has been localized to fit to the custom in each area. Since Japanese immigrants came to Hawaii from the various regions of Japan, ceremonial customs are different according to the area where the family came from. However, as time passes, those customs are becoming unclear and more confusing for the younger generations. Because of this confusion, younger generations seem to be going away from Buddhism by saying that Buddhism is hard to under-



stand. Therefore, in this article, I would like to explain the standard procedure of doing a service. First, let me show you the two common procedures of having funerals among the members of Jodo Mission of Hawaii.

1. When Someone Passed Away 2.
