RESEARCH EXPERIENCE

Self-designed and executed research projects:

• Ethiopia & Switzerland: Second Book Project.

This project is an intellectual history of Africa's regional refugee law. My goal is to trace the impact of ideas of pan-Africanism, and the effects of decolonization and the Cold War on the existence of the convention and the formulation of its various drafts. The African refugee convention not only determined the fate of African refugees until the present day, but it also inspired the South American Cartagena refuge declaration of 1984. Archival research will primarily be conducted in Addis Ababa at the African Union's (AU) archives and at the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) archives in Geneva during the spring of 2019.

- Kenya & Switzerland: Skilled Return Migration. In the summer of 2016 I engaged in preliminary research in the archives of the International Organization for Migration (IOM), the International Labor Organization (ILO), the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) in Geneva, Switzerland, as well as the IOM's regional and field offices in Nairobi, Kenya, to assess their material regarding programs that targeted return migration of skilled Africans to develop their home countries post-decolonization. I plan to develop this into an article.
- Angola, Germany, Mozambique, Portugal, South Africa: Dissertation Research. Between 2014 and 2015 I conducted 268 life history interviews with former workers, students, and government personal in Angola, Mozambique and Germany. These included individual and group interviews, semi-structured, structured and unstructured conversations, and the application of a survey to 251 people. In addition, I consulted the national archives and various ministerial archives across the five countries. As a spin off I produced a short film about the Mozambican workers together with filmmaker Jack Davis: "A Democratic Republic of the Mind." In addition, I published in relevant non-academic journals and gave interviews to Zimbabwean, Dutch and German press.
- Indonesia: GIZ consultancy: In 2012 I spent three months researching and assessing one of the central program components of the Center for International Migration at the German Development Cooperation Agency, GIZ, designed to facilitate the return and reintegration of Germany-trained experts into their home communities. To that end, I visited returned experts in their work environments across Indonesia and conducted in depth interviews about their experience. The strategic report was published in the CIM Paper Series (6) of the Center for International Development of the GIZ, May 2014.
- Namibia & South Africa. Masters thesis research. In April 2010 I expanded my Bachelor research on the nexus between land rights, identity and development by including a comparative case of the Hai||om San in Outjo and Outjiwarongo in Namibia. I conducted interviews with community leaders and members, NGO workers, journalists and legal consultants in Windhoek and beyond. Further, I consulted documents at the Namibian national archives.
- South Africa: Bachelor thesis research. The thesis historically situates the ‡Khomani San land claims and traces the development, application, and appropriation of the Bushman myth and its power to define traditions. Over a period of three months in 2008 I conducted individual and group oral history interviews with the ‡Khomani community in Afrikaans and engaged in participant observation on their lands in the Green Kalahari. I interviewed their lawyer, government personal, NGO workers and lodge owners from the Northern Cape. I consulted documents in the National Archives and the University of the Witwatersrand Archives in Johannesburg, and the Cape Town Archives. In 2009 I also worked with community members to put on an exhibition at Mount Holyoke College "Under the Shadow of the Camera: Reflections of the ‡Khomani San," focusing on San photographic depictions of their own realities and historical San Western interactions. I went back to the community to discuss the research results in 2010.

• International Labor Organization: From June until December 2007 I researched global production and migration chains, focusing on migration in the health and IT sectors in South Africa, resulting in an internal report: "Dynamics and determinants of South African intellectual/scientific diaspora communities and their possible contributions to the socio-economic and political advancement of South African development."
